▪ Walk – 5 November

Whenever I see a horse in a field on its own, I feel it looks lonely and in need of company. Now I am sure of it - read on. We passed Burys Court School, formerly the home of the Charringtons of Brewery fame, then through the churchyard nearby. We turned up a slight gradient, and had very good views of the North Downs, and Leith Hill in the distance, and could make out the church on Ranmore Common.
